

Refreshed Water Park Opens May 17

The Water Park will open on May 17 with a new look and new convenience. It will operate weekends only until school lets out, and then daily.

Water Park hours will remain 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. **Swimming lesson sign ups will begin on April 1**, at Town Hall, Monday - Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The bathhouse, entrance and fence surround will all have a new look. Renovations to the bathhouse will include changing the entrance. No longer will you have to go through the bathrooms to get to the pool. The new entrance will be at the top of the original steps to a ticket booth, then entry to the left.

The old metal partitions in the bathrooms are being replaced with sturdier heavy plastic ones, and lockers will be located in each bathroom instead of on the other end of the park. A new more attractive fence will surround the whole park, in addition to design enhancements on the circle and Gordon Stinnett Avenue.

Meet the Neighbors

In our series on the communities that make up our Town, we focus this issue on an organization with a very special role, rather than a residential neighborhood.

You see it every day, up on the hill overlooking route 260, flags flying over all that passes. You may have played bingo there, or seen an Eagle Scout court of honor, or danced at someone's wedding, but given no thought to what the real purpose of the building is.

If you attended one of those events, you were at the Stallings-Williams Post of the American Legion, where Legionnaires, Auxiliaries, and Sons of the American Legion socialize and host fund-raising events, but all with one purpose, to honor those who have served our nation in the armed services, and to promote the freedoms for which they fought.


The names Stallings and Williams are familiar to anyone who has read the "Honor Roll" at the Veterans Memorial. James Franklin Stallings was lost in action over Holland on September 22, 1944. He was 21 years old. Jesse Whittier Williams gave his life in France on August 17, 1944 at the age of 26.

The 47 members of Post #206 chose to honor these local heroes by naming it for the two when the national headquarters of the American Legion granted a charter to the Post on September 25, 1946. It has been an important part of the community ever since, in their aerie on Route 260 only since 1966.

They moved from pillar to post in their first 20 years, starting in the North Beach Town Hall, moving to a rented building, then a purchased house next to Mother Brown's store on Chesapeake Avenue, which they outgrew in five years and sold in 1958 to the Browns. For the next seven years they saved money as they met in the Chesapeake Beach Town Hall and various restaurants, all now gone.

The group purchased their home property, three acres, in 1964 for

Post 206 Serves Community, Honors Military Veterans




Lofty goals and a tall order, but the men and women of Post 206 do it, in very visible ways and those you never see. If you have attended a Memorial Day or Veterans Day wreath laying at Veterans Park, you have seen the Legion. If you see American flags on the graves at Southern Memorial gardens and other local cemeteries, you have seen the

\$3,049.10 "including the settlement cost," according to the history on the Post website. With a bank loan and volunteer labor, they built their home for "a little under \$25,000, including the cost of the property, clearing the land, grading and excavating" and celebrated with their first event, a dance on November 19, 1966, that made \$621.10.

Since then it has been a place where members, including Auxiliary and Sons of the American Legion, can gather to socialize, with dances, dinners, even a Pool League. Membership is open to all who served honorably in time of war from World War I forward. But socializing is only a part of the Post's existence.

The American Legion constitution states that "For God and Country we associate ourselves together for the following purposes: to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred percent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the great wars; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and goodwill on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy, to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."



April 5 Rail Trail Bus, Boat 'Hike'

Bus and boat aren't transports that spring to mind when you think of the Chesapeake Beach *Railway* Museum, but for train buffs, those vehicles will play an important role in the Museum's traditional spring kick-off, the annual Railway Right of Way hike on April 5.

There will be no walking this year. In a departure from tradition, the event will cover not just a portion, but the entire route of the Railway by bus from the museum to the end of the line at Seat Pleasant. The boat portion will be a trip into the Patuxent to see the line's turntable. The trip will include a stop at Mt. Calvert for a box lunch, bus and boat, for a fee that has not yet been determined.

The annual free Spring Family Fun Day will be held on May 18 from 12:30-3:30. As always, it will feature entertainment and activities for the whole family, but details are still developing.

Like the trail "hike" and everything else the museum does, the Fun Day requires much volunteer support. Lacrosse Sign-ups on Buc Girls Prepping For Pro Bowl Trip

The qualifiers include Morgan, Amber Wilson, 11; Deanna Lucas, 11; Natalie Lake, 11; sisters Alexis, 13, and Shelby, 15, Richardson-Lau, Briana Smith, 13; Kiera Murphy, 13; Brittany Hagan, 16, and Mandie Harrison, 16.

Community donations and sponsorships are sought for the cheerleaders going to Hawaii. Contributions can be made to the Beach Buccaneers Youth Club, a 501c3 organization, designated for the Pro Bowl fund.

A good book is often a welcome friend in winter, and Twin Beaches library has plenty to choose from. But this month offers a new twist – one book that all of Southern Maryland will be sharing.

The region is taking part in the Big Read, a project of the National Endowment for the Humanities in which entire communities read and discuss the same book. Sponsored by the College of Southern Maryland, the “read” is happening in all three counties, and the book chosen is *A Lesson Before Dying* by Ernest Gaines. It will be the subject of the monthly adult book discussion for March.

All discussions take place at Bayhill Market 7 p.m. Topics for the quarter are:

April 14: *American Brutus: John Wilkes Booth and the Lincoln Conspiracies*, by Michael W. Kauffman.

Since the Family Fun Fest events began at Beach Elementary four years ago, school readiness scores have increased by more than 10% at the school.
