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From the Mayor

In this edition of the Newsletter, I want to share with you progress on our many projects, and since we are in our budget cycle, I will bring you up to date on your town's financial condition.

Waste Water Treatment Plant

The Town resumed operation of the Chesapeake Beach Waste Water Treatment Plant from Calvert County on February 1st, ending a contractual arrangement that dated back to 1990. The Town Council and I took this step for two reasons: to save rate payers money and to prevent any future discharges of untreated effluent into the Chesapeake Bay. I am pleased to say that we have achieved a smooth transition and that the three plant operators have chosen to become Town employees. Over the past year, we have made many necessary repairs to assure that spills are eliminated. We've outsourced lab tests and sludge disposal and we anticipate saving nearly \$75,000 per year by these changes. Please welcome Plant Supervisor Jon Castro and Plant Operators Tim McCoy and Bob Haynes as new town employees in this most vital municipal function.

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Public Works Report

One of the most frequent complaints we get at Town Hall is "How did I use that much water? You need to check your meter."

Here are some facts you should know:

- 25 % of the water used in the home is for showers, and if each member of a family of four takes a 5 minute shower, it can use up to 700 gallons a day or 63,000 gallons a quarter.
- The Town bills in 3 month quarters. A leaking faucet or toilet can use 20 gallons each a day, or 1,800 gallons per quarter.

So what can you do? Here are some suggestions to conserve water:

- Install new low-flow shower heads. With the new technology, you will barely notice the difference.
- Fix any leaky faucets. Most hardware stores can show you how.
- Fill an old two-liter bottle with water and put it in your toilet tank. You will save 2 liters with every flush.
- Test your toilet for leaks. Town Hall has free dye strips you can use to see if you have a leaky toilet in need of repair.

These are simple, easy steps that can save you money and help conserve a valuable resource while protecting our environment.

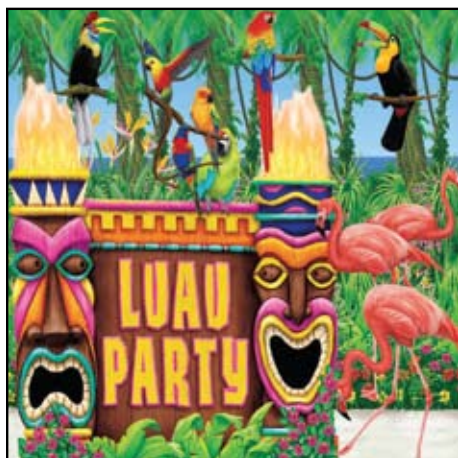

Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail

The construction of the Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail has continued through the winter, and there is remarkable progress. Nearly all of the pilings have been driven, all paving has been done except the Richfield Station portion, and much of the decking is complete. Keep an eye out for a dedication ceremony announcement this summer.

The trail will begin across the street from the Tot Lot adjacent to Kellam's Field following a stamped concrete walkway to Fishing Creek by the rear range marker which marks the creek's entrance from the Bay. Where the trail meets the creek, it will follow a path along a newly constructed eight foot wide timber walkway that will reach up to the intersection of a new bridge across the creek to the south side, and to a walkway over the marsh that leads into Bayview Hills. Once across the bridge to the south side, you are actually on the old Chesapeake Beach Railway right of way. Travelling west, you encounter a second bridge that goes across the creek at the site of the original railroad trestle.

Back at the intersection, going right (north), you will enter Bayview Hills. A little further along the trail you will encounter another timber walkway across the marsh. This leads to Richfield Station. This area is still under construction in Richfield Station, but when finished, will tie into the street system and connect to Sansbury Drive.

Please be patient with the progress we've made, and don't trespass in the trail area while it is still under construction. We'll soon have sidewalks and paths for your convenience!

Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society

As I mentioned in the previous two editions of the Newsletter, the construction of the trail provides the perfect opportunity to cultivate oysters in cages underneath the timber walkway in Fishing Creek at the eastern end of the trail. I am pleased to announce that Keith Pardieck, my neighbor and Biologist at the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, has agreed to serve as the chairman of the Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS), a name we unabashedly appropriated from our good friends and advisors at the Southern Maryland Oyster Cultivation Society (SMOCS) in Solomons Island. The SMOCS organization has been a great model for the program we are starting here, and their leaders have been incredibly supportive of our efforts, for which I am very grateful. Look elsewhere in this newsletter for more on CBOCS. And thanks, Keith!

Money, Money, Money!

As the Town Staff and I prepare our Fiscal Year 2012 Budget, the effects of the recession have truly hit home. While I am certain that many of you are very happy that your property taxes will be less next year, this poses a challenge for your town government. The recent reassessment of home values will result in a reduction of revenues to the town of approximately \$450,000. And the State Government's withholding of the Highway User Revenue (HUR) funds yields another loss of

\$300,000. As you can well imagine, the magnitude of these revenue reductions has required us to very carefully evaluate every program and project. The proposed (but not approved by Town Council as of this writing) solutions to these revenue shortfalls are to do no street repaving this coming year, make no contribution to the Rainy Day fund (currently funded at \$1.7 million), and to use approximately \$250,000 of reserves to balance the budget. I am not proposing any furloughs or layoffs of town staff, but I am also not proposing any cost of living or step increases. It is a tough time, but I am confident that we will come through this recession intact.

A Valuable Resource for our Town

I don't know if you are aware of it, but we have the largest charter fishing fleet on the Chesapeake Bay right here in Chesapeake Beach! Our boat captains are a valuable resource to the economy of our Town, and I know we are all appreciative of what they bring to the success of Chesapeake Beach. Economic times are tough for everyone these days, so I hope you'll remember to recommend their services to your friends, colleagues, relatives and business associates. Charter Fishing can be a wonderful outing not only for families, but also for government agencies and companies in the area. I hope you'll join me in supporting our Charter Boat Captains! And don't forget, Rockfish Season opens on April 16 and the Annual

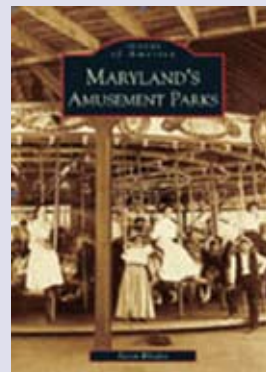

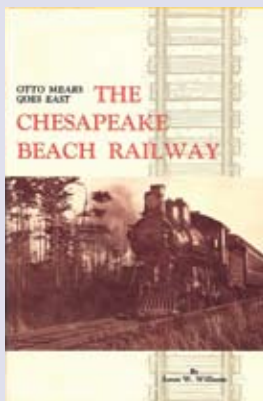
What Am I Reading?

Mayor Bruce Wahl and Twin Beaches Library Manager Joanie Kilmon recently had a conversation regarding books that contain some reference to Chesapeake Beach. Both have collected many Chesapeake Beach titles over the years and agreed to share those titles in forthcoming issues of the Newsletter. Bruce's title for this issue is "Maryland's Amusement Parks" by Jason Rhodes, published by Arcadia Publishing.



This book contains ten pages of photos and captions about the amusement parks here in Chesapeake Beach, which existed from 1900 until 1972. The amusement park started out on a long boardwalk over the water until it moved inland in the 1930's. It was originally served by the Chesapeake Beach Railway and steamboats from Baltimore. After the 1930's, patrons arrived by automobile.

Most of the photos in this volume are from the collection of the Chesapeake Beach Railway Museum, a wonderful resource for our community. One fascinating aspect of this book is to see how Chesapeake Beach compared to other parks across the state. This is a very entertaining book and a fascinating look into the past and Bruce recommends it highly.



At the top of Joanie's collection list is "Otto Mears Goes East: the Chesapeake Beach Railway" by Ames W. Williams. Published in 1975, the book really started the movement in town to preserve and share our history. The Railway Museum was definitely inspired by Judge Williams' incredible research and beautiful book – filled with photographs, drawings and maps of life in Chesapeake Beach – before, during and after the Railway. If you have not yet read our history, the book is for sale at the Railway Museum (410-257-3892) or available for checkout at the Twin Beaches Library (410-257-2411).

NOTE: Summer schedule starts June 1st through October 31st with an additional regular trash collection on FRIDAY.

When a holiday falls on Monday or Tuesday, pick up will be a day later. For instance, if your trash day is MONDAY, pick up will be on TUESDAY, and if your trash day is TUESDAY, pick up will be on WEDNESDAY. Similarly, if there is a Friday holiday and Friday is your recycling day, recycling will be picked up on SATURDAY.

Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS)

Exciting news! The Town of Chesapeake Beach is partnering with the Southern Maryland Oyster Cultivation Society (SMOCS) and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to provide a collaborative and fun opportunity for the citizens and businesses of Chesapeake Beach to improve local water quality, while gaining knowledge of the Bay ecosystem. These fortunate volunteers will be assisting with national, state and private efforts to restore the Chesapeake Bay, through oyster gardening and oyster reef restoration.

We have held our first meeting/planning session and we are very fortunate to have Keith Pardieck as our CBOCS Chairman!

Our new program will rely on citizen volunteers – gardeners – to grow, or garden, oysters and help plant them in local oyster reefs. If you have your own pier or water access, great! But if you don't, that's not a problem. The town will provide gardening space below the soon to be completed Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail timber walkway!

We anticipate establishing the first oyster gardens this summer, but there is a lot to be done before then, and we need your help. So if you are interested in participating in this exciting venture, visit our website at www.chesapeake-beach.md.us and click on the CBOCS link. Or you can also contact Kathy Johnson at Town Hall to sign up!

Here's how it is done:

- Gardeners receive spat and cages (Buoyant Oyster Cultivation System or rectangular cages) which they help place
- Gardeners grow the oysters for about one year



- Gardeners help gather the yearling oysters and assist with planting them on local reefs
- Gardeners receive more spat and the cycle begins anew

The time commitment is about two half-days during the summer to: 1) help refill oyster gardens with new spat on shell, and 2) remove yearling oysters from gardens and plant them on local reefs. There are other opportunities to help out as well, and we welcome your further participation.

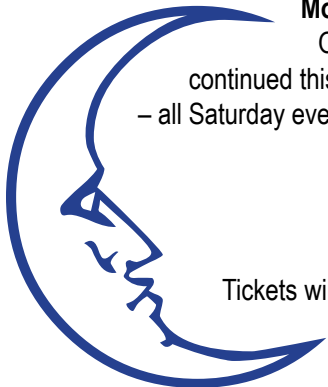

Volunteerism at its Finest

We can all rest easier in Chesapeake Beach, knowing our friends and neighbors at the North Beach Volunteer Fire Department (NBVFD) are watching out for us.

We all volunteer for various activities in our community – some of us for our children's school or sporting events, some for community events, others for church or service club activities. But the men and women of the NBVFD not only volunteer their time on our behalf...they put their lives on the line for us! 100% VOLUNTEER!

Knowing that the leadership at the Fire House was changing after a number of years, your Editor called the President of the NBVFD Bobby Allen and asked if he would be willing to talk about retiring Chief Billy Freesland. Bobby, as everyone knows him, told me he would welcome the opportunity to talk about Billy, but that he wanted to do it in person, not over the telephone – it was too big a story to tell over the phone. A dedicated volunteer fireman himself, Bobby's voice becomes quiet and reverent when he speaks of Billy Freesland. You can hear the respect he has for him in his tone when he refers to Billy as a "silent giant" – a man who is always prepared and always there for his comrades and for us. He's the "go-to" person on about everything!

Billy, who was raised in the

Chesapeake Beach-North Beach area, joined the Fire Service in 1974 when he was still in his teens. Even as a student at Salisbury State, he came home every weekend so he could maintain his active status with the NBVFD. While earning his college degree, he excelled at athletics and was a soccer superstar in addition to continuing his service back home. When he returned to the Beaches and went to work for BGE, he continued his dedicated service to the Fire Department and he lived for a time at the Fire House. He's now married to Ruth Ann and has a daughter and son – both soccer players. In addition to his full-time position as an executive with BGE, his family responsibilities, and his various other activities, he still manages his dedicated work at the Fire House and his service as President of the Calvert County Fire and Rescue Association. Bobby asked him how he could handle it all, and Billy looked at him and said..."time management...it's all time management."

During Billy's 36 years with the Fire and EMT Service, he spent 27 of them as a Chief Officer: two years as Safety Officer, two as Deputy Chief, four as Assistant Chief and 19 years as Chief Officer. He is a highly decorated officer,



earning awards from both our North Beach Volunteer Fire Department and Calvert County. He entered the Calvert County Fire and Rescue Association Hall of Fame in the 1990s and three years ago the Southern Maryland Firemen's Hall of Fame.

This year, Billy decided to step down as Chief and did not seek re-election. His leadership will be missed. He is truly our hero!

The North Beach Volunteer Fire Department has 120-125 men and women on their rolls, with 40-50 in the "core group." They are continually training to remain top-notch as both Firemen and EMT personnel and they maintain an arsenal of equipment as well: two Fire Engines, one Rescue Piece, one Ladder Truck, one Fire Boat, a couple of Zodiacs and two Ambulances. Funds contributed to the Fire Department go directly to training the personnel and maintaining the vehicles.

The next time you run into one of these brave souls, give them a big thank you for their dedicated service. And remember, they are 100% VOLUNTEER!

Mosquito Season is Just Around the Corner

It won't be long before we're swatting mosquitoes and working to control them in our neighborhoods. We obviously do this for two reasons: to avoid nuisance biting, and to preclude the spread of mosquito-borne disease. Calvert County Mosquito Control has provided us with information, and some suggestions, that we as citizens can do to help stop the breeding of these little pests.

The important thing to remember is that when it comes to breeding grounds for mosquitoes, they need stagnant water in order to lay their eggs. You may be surprised at the number of areas around your home where mosquitoes find the stagnant water they need to breed. Remember! If it can hold water for more than a few days, it can breed mosquitoes!

Here are some remedies and preventative measures you can take:

Fishponds: While these are beautiful landscape water features, mosquitoes find these to be ideal breeding grounds, especially if the pond is in disuse.

SOLUTION: If the pond is in disuse, Calvert County Mosquito Control can provide you with mosquito fish free of charge. If the pond is active, be sure to remove excess vegetation, as it can provide a stable breeding ground.

Swimming Pools: If your pool is active and maintained it should not create a problem. But if it is neglected it becomes a large pool of stagnant water and an excellent breeding ground.

SOLUTION: Maintain your pool. If you cannot maintain it, contact Calvert County Mosquito Control and ask them about mosquito fish. These fish can easily survive in your pool, and they will devour the mosquito larvae.

Bird Bath: While they are designed to attract birds, unfortunately, they also attract mosquitoes. Bird baths are a major source of mosquitoes that many



people overlook. It is a shallow source of water, so the water is warmer, and actually encourages mosquitoes to grow faster! **SOLUTION:** All you have to do is change the water every few days. In other words...just wash it out with your garden hose! It's easy!

Clogged Gutter: When trees lose their leaves, and they end up in your gutter, little pools of standing water result. These last longer than you realize, and when mosquito season rolls around, they have a perfect place to breed. **SOLUTION:** This one requires a little more work on your part. Roll up your

sleeves, and clean out that gutter before the weather gets too warm. Or better yet, hire someone to do it!

Tarps: These are used to protect those items we don't want to get wet. Things like firewood, truck beds, boats, etc. While they provide a good protection, there are dips in the tarp that trap stagnant water. And all it takes is a little water for those pesky mosquitoes

to breed! **SOLUTION:** During nice weather, you really don't need those tarps. If you think you do, every few days you should remove the tarp and shake it out.

Old Tires: When people leave their old tires outside, they naturally catch the rain and it is almost impossible to empty out ALL the water. Inevitably, a little water remains, and produces a breeding ground for mosquitoes. **SOLUTION:** The best and easiest solution

is simply to get rid of the old tires! Take them to the dump, or pay a tire store or gas station to recycle them. If you want to hang onto the old tires, store them in a dry place.
