
TOWN ELECTIONS ARE NEAR

Of particular interest in this issue is the once-every-four-years Voters' Guide. The term of the Mayor and Town Council will expire on December 20th, when they will be replaced by the new Mayor and the top six vote-getting Town Council candidates, who will be elected on November 6th at the Northeast Community Center. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Note the change in location, which was made due to the increase in the number of registered voters, understanding that the Town Hall is simply not large enough to accommodate everyone with the efficiency and privacy desired. The move to the Community Center will alleviate this problem.

Another Successful Summer!

It's hard to believe another Season has come and gone. We want to offer a special thanks to all of you who came to visit us this summer!

As we look back on this season, I would like to recognize the professionalism exhibited by our lifeguards. The heroism and composure shown by the staff, especially on July 6, led to the full recovery of a six-year-old boy who nearly drowned. A special thanks to the first lifeguard on the scene, Patrick Laiosa of Huntingtown, MD.

As a result of this incident and the unusual amount of rescues made by the guards earlier in the season, we instituted a new policy. Effective July 7, a mandatory rest period was instituted. This meant that every two hours the water was cleared for 15 minutes, forcing our guests to rest as we encouraged them to hydrate. The mandatory rest periods dramatically reduced the number of rescues during the remainder of the season. We plan to continue this policy next year, but will most likely allow the adults to stay in the water during the times that the pool is cleared.

Our new sound system was a great success this season. This system was recommended by the Water Park Advisory Committee, and a special thanks goes to Town Council members Stewart Cumbo and Valerie Beaudin for presenting to Council their support. This sound system allows us to get vital safety messages to the guests, inform them of special products or menu items being offered that day, and announce all of our upcoming special events.

This season, we also saw the creation of Adult Swim, which was offered at the same time as the Children's Swim Lessons. The feedback was very positive, so we are studying the feasibility of expanding this even more. Elmo made his first debut at the Park and was a big hit. We also continued to offer Friday Night Slides, which has turned out to be a nice family night for the Chesapeake Beach residents.

The end of the season is always bitter sweet. The slower pace is welcomed, but it is always sad to say goodbye to the young adults, some who have been with us for up to eight seasons in a row. They are moving into their professional careers. I would like to wish all of them the best and hope as they grow in their lives, they will look upon their experience here at the Water Park as a great learning experience and one that will make a difference in their future careers.

In closing, our work is cut out for us in the off-season. We will focus on the general maintenance that is required each year to ensure that our Water Park is a safe, family environment. The Year of the Oysters

The Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society's (CBOCS) first year has ended very successfully. On September 8th, the roughly 100,000 yearling oysters in the 26 CBOCS rotating cages were removed and transported to their new home in the Chesapeake Bay at "Old Rock," now an oyster sanctuary. The cages were power washed and stored for a week at the Town's Public Works storage yard.

One highly successful element of this first day's work was the use of Public Works Superintendent Jay Berry's "cage claws," attached to the Town's brand new Kubota Mini-Excavator. As you can see in the photos, this device saved a lot of back-breaking work by eliminating the need to hand lift the full cages, each weighing about 150 pounds. I complimented Jay and his Public Works crew for working with their heads instead of their backs!

The following week, on restocking day, CBOCS volunteers loaded the cages with new spat on shells at Marina West and then towed the cages into position about 1/4 mile upstream in Fishing Creek to their assigned locations. Volunteers in kayaks and jon boats maneuvered the loaded cages into place, secured them, and then configured the rotation mechanism.

On both days, the number of volunteers that turned out for the effort was very impressive! On September 8, nearly 70 people showed up to help. On the restocking day, September 15, over 30 volunteers and the Public Works crew made the work go quickly.

The first year of the CBOCS program has been a wonderful opportunity to bring the community together for the common goal of enhancing the health of the Chesapeake Bay and Fishing Creek. Under the leadership of Keith Pardieck, this volunteer program has been very successful. John Bacon, head of the Water Quality Monitoring Committee, has also done significant outreach to local school children to spread the word about CBOCS. A great big "Thank You" goes out to all of the volunteers who have made our first year such a success.

New Beach Elementary Improvements

Last month, the Calvert County Board of Education presented the school system's Capital Improvement Program from fiscal year (FY) 2014 through FY 2019. Included for major improvements were Northern High School, Beach Elementary School, and Northern Middle School—in that order.

A feasibility study on whether to renovate or relocate Beach Elementary School will most likely begin in FY 2017, with planning in FY 2019, and construction in FY 2020.

The Superintendent of Calvert County Public Schools, Dr. Jack Smith, said that he was "interested and concerned to get Beach in the pipeline this year."

Mayor Wahl agreed with the importance of keeping up with the growing demands on Beach Elementary School and stated, "Schools are the fabric of our Town and a critical part of our community."

In the meantime, minor improvements have been made to Beach Elementary School including air conditioning in the gym.

So while 2020 may seem like a ways away... Beach Elementary School is finally "on the list!"

The Summary Page shows your most recent billing data, payments made, and your remaining balance due.



Pay your bill using Visa, MasterCard or Discover without incurring any additional fees.

The Town is pleased to offer the added convenience of paying your water and sewer bills online, using Visa, MasterCard or Discover with no additional service fees. To access the site, visit the Town's home page at http://www.chesapeake-beach.md.us. Click on the link to register for online bill pay. You will be redirected to a secure site.

The first webpage you will see is a login page. You will need your account number and password to login. Your account number is located on the top portion of your water/sewer bill. It consists of seven characters – five numbers with a period separating the fifth and sixth number. The first digit of your account number will always be a zero. The last two digits will also be zero. For example, account #123 would be listed as 00123.00

First-time user passwords are preset. Your password will be the first four letters from the last name on the account, plus the first two letters from the first name, plus "00." For example, John Smith's password would be "SmitJo00."

If your name contains a special character such as an apostrophe, you do not know your account number, or you have problems logging in, please contact Town Hall at 301-855-8398. One of our staff will assist you.

Once you login, you will be given an option to choose a new password. Interested in going green? You will also be given the opportunity to sign up for e-billing. With this option, you will receive your utility bills via e-mail. If you do not sign up for e-billing at your initial login, and wish to do so, please contact Town Hall for assistance.

Once you have obtained access to the site, you will see a summary page. This page shows your most recent billing data, payments made, and your remaining balance due. To make a payment, click on the "Pay Now" button.

You will be directed to the billing page. Click on the "Credit Pay" button. On the next screen, you will enter your credit card and billing information. The Town does not charge a convenience fee for this service. Once you have entered your information, click on "Submit." That's it!



Fill out your billing information and click the "Submit" button. Then you're done! Payments will be posted to your billing account usually on the next business day.
