

### FROM THE MAYOR



We gre all working hard on your behalf! In this issue, I'm happy to share information with you regarding a number of important projects and governance issues.

### **ENHANCED NUTRIENT REDUCTION** (ENR) CONTRACT AWARD

At the January Town Council Meeting, the Council approved the award of the upgrade to the Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) to Bearing Construction, Inc. of Sudlersville, MD, and the management of the project to the desian firm Whitman, Requardt, and Associates. LLP. The total amount to be funded is \$16,158,930, which includes funds allocated for administrative and legal fees. The approval of this contract award secures State grant funding of 45.34% of the total amount. The balance of \$9,287,117 will be shared among the partners of the plant: Chesapeake Beach, North Beach, Calvert County and Anne Arundel County. The Town of Chesapeake Beach's share is \$4,611,982.30 and will be financed through Continued, see **Mayor**, page 5.

a low-interest loan from the Maryland Department of the Environment. This low-interest loan was also at risk had the Town Council not approved this contract award at the January meeting. Thankfully, that risk was averted by approval of the contract award.

were fortunate that nine firms bid on the project. with Bearing Construction being the lowest bidder. You can rest assured that the Town is spending your money as prudently as is possible.

What is ENR? Simply stated, the purpose of this project is to reduce pollution in the treated effluent that is discharged into the Chesapeake Bay. Particularly, there is a Federal EPA requirement to meet a "Total Maximum Daily Load" (TMDL) standard of the amount of Nitrogen and Phosphorous that can be discharged. These nutrients cause algae blooms that absorb oxygen in the Bay and block sunlight from reaching submerged aquatic vegetation (SAV), hence stunting the growth of these beneficial plants.

In addition to the nutrient reduction, this project replaces much gaing and failing equipment: some items have been in service for over thirty years. At the time we are doing this, the plant is being expanded from 1.32 million aallons per day (MGD) to **ELECTION CAMPAIGN FINANCE** 1.5 MGD, the capacity that is specified on our permit. This expansion was unanimously approved by an action of the Town Council in 2005 by an irrevocable resolution. Four of the 2005 Council members are still serving as elected officials in the Town: myself, Council Vice-President Patrick Mahoney, Councilman Stewart Cumbo and Councilwoman Valerie Beaudin.

#### **BRIDGE REPLACEMENT**

The Town staff and I have been engaged in detailed discussions with the Maryland State Highway Administration regarding the long-awaited replaceport to you that this project is now funded-2015.





## "Poplar Island, My Memories as a Boy"

As many of you know by now, I truly enjoy reading books about the region in which we are privileged to live. I have collected quite a library over the past forty years, and the title I am reviewing this time is one of my favorites. It is "Poplar Island, My Memories as a Boy" by Peter K. Bailey, published in 1996. The Poplar Island Group consists of three islands, Poplar, Coaches and Jefferson Islands, and lies in the Chesapeake Bay to the east of Chesapeake Beach near the Eastern Shore.

In 1948, Peter Bailey's father, George Kennedy Bailey, purchased Poplar Island in order to rebuild the hunting and fishing lodge that had originally been created in 1931 as the "Jefferson Islands Club." This club had been an exclusive resort for prominent Democrats and was very popular with many politicians, including President Franklin Roosevelt. Unfortunately, the clubhouse was destroyed by an electrical fire in 1946. The club was unable to rebuild it due to insurance limitations and ultimately moved to another location. This cleared the way for the elder Bailey to fulfill his dream of creating the lodge which he had desired for years. At the time that the Bailey family moved to the island, the author was seven years old.

It's hard to imagine what life must have been like living on an island in the Bay two miles offshore, but the

author does a good job of painting this mental picture, and the book includes many photographs depicting the years that he lived there. As you might expect, there are numerous stories about hunting, fishing, crabbing and all of the things we associate with life in the "Land of Pleasant Living." This all came to an unfortunate end when the elder Bailey prematurely passed away in 1951. Thankfully, there were some photographs and the author's memories. This work is his effort to commit to writing his recollections of living on Poplar Island. It's a story worth telling and certainly worth reading!

In the postlude to the book, which was written in 1996, the author describes a plan by the State of Maryland to build dikes to hold dredge spoils. Since the book was written, this has indeed come to pass. Where the islands were once threatened by erosion to disappear forever, just as Sharp's Island has done, this is no longer the case. Using Google maps (http://maps.google.com), you can see the extent of the land reclamation, and you can also see the lodge and dock still prominently standing on the easternmost island, Jefferson Island, safely protected from erosion by this huge project.

I hope that you will enjoy this book as much as I have. It is available from Amazon.com and other booksellers. ISBN 0-9655453-0-X.
