Moving and Grooving THE CBOCS PROGRAMS AT FISHING CREEK AND BROWNIES BEACH

Lots has been going on with the Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS). New flora signs have been placed along Fishing Creek and Brownies Beach. Our oyster larvae are flourishing. The CHESPAX program to study oysters has expanded. So much of this success is due to the continued support of all our CBOCS members and volunteers.

FLORA SIGNS


During July and August Master Gardeners and Master Naturalists from Calvert County surveyed the flora along Fishing Creek and Brownies Beach. They identified 49 different species. Nancy Feuerle took photos of each and collected leaf samples. She then prepared graphics to be attached to sign posts. The lamination was done by TNT Graphics, and the signs were attached to wooden posts by CBOCS volunteers.

On October 25, under Nancy's direction, 32 CBOCS members, friends, LORAX Club students from Northern High School and Chesapeake Beach maintenance personnel installed the signs. The results are spectacular, and we receive many positive comments from trail walkers.

Nancy is continuing to obtain laminated specimens of all the leaves to be used for classroom education with the new smart board program. She is also preparing an activity book, "Flora of Chesapeake Beach," which will provide an excellent field guide for interested people walking our trails.

OYSTER LARVAE

There is an exciting news update about the oyster larvae to spat cycle. In early September, Beach Elementary students were able to participate in deploying



into a tank of shells. During this time, Mary Butz, a Beach Elementary science teacher, took some larvae and put them under a 40power microscope. It was amazing to see that the poppy seed-sized larvae were actually fully developed oysters. During the next eight weeks, they grew to be the size of a dime.



September, October and November brought 14 busloads of 5th grade students from six northern Calvert County elementary schools to Fishing Creek for the oyster field trip sponsored by CHESPAX. During this time, CBOCS provided the classroom, laboratory and security while the Calvert





County's Department of Natural Resources staff provided the instruction.

Each trip lasted three hours and included identification of oyster animals, measuring of oyster spat and testing water quality and depth. At the end, a discussion was held to determine if Fishing Creek was a good place for an oyster garden. The answer was a resounding, "Yes!"

There were special visits from Commissioner Evan Slaughenhoupt, Superintendent of Calvert Schools Dr. Daniel Curry, several senior staff from Calvert schools and the Calvert County Natural Resource Department.

UPCOMING EVENTS

Chesapeake Beach's oyster tree will be on display again this year in the Town Hall lobby from December 1 to 19.5th grade students at Beach Elementary School are busy decorating oyster shells to hang on the tree. Plan to visit Town Hall during early December to see their creations.

During January, we will be busy working on the smart board program module ti-

tled "Treasures of a Tidal Marsh."

In February, the CBOCS is expecting to receive the permit to deploy the reef balls on the Old Rock Reef. Deployment will probably happen later in the spring on a warm calm day.


Halloween Family Fun Night at the Water Park

Honorable Edward B. Finch Sr.

Honorable Edward B. Finch Sr. died peacefully at Anne Arundel Medical Center on November 11, 2014 with his family by his side. He was 90 years old. Edward is survived by his wife of 68 years, Barbara Joanne "Jo" Finch, and their children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and great great grandchildren. He is preceded in death by two of his children.

Edward was born on July 14, 1924 in Washington, D.C. He proudly served his country in the Navy during WWII and was decorated for his bravery. He married Jo (currently Chesapeake Beach's very own "Mother Christmas") in 1946. Edward graduated from Catholic University with a law degree. And was the Chief Administrative Law Judge for the Environmental Protection Agency when he retired.

Brownies Beach The Jewel at the End of Our Boardwalk

At the south end of Bayfront Park lies what locals have long called "Brownies Beach." This little patch of shelly sand represents a rare bit of natural shoreline along our town's largely armored waterfront. Brownies Beach changes seasonally, as all beaches do, and remains a remarkably resilient community treasure for us all to enjoy. However, in a time of rising sea level, and likely more powerful storms, natural waterfront such as Brownies Beach will become more rare. In order to be better stewards of the geological gem at the end of our boardwalk, it's important to understand a bit of how our beach originated, and how it functions.

The Atlantic Coastal Plain – the region in which we all live – is a broad apron of layered gravel, sand, and mud that extends outward from the more rocky, elevated landscapes of the inland Piedmont. For roughly 200 million years sediment grains have been shed into the

opening Atlantic from that more ancient Piedmont, accumulating layer after layer through periods of sea-level rise and fall, until reaching several miles in thickness. In Chesapeake Beach, the top of that vast sedimentary wedge is seen exposed along the shore, just south of Brownies Beach. The older portion is exposed at eye-level and called the Calvert Formation, while the younger Choptank Formation can be seen towering above near Randle Cliff. These layers accumulated at the bottom of an ancient inland sea called the Salisbury Embayment, spread over the Atlantic Coastal plain at a time of much higher sea level - the Middle Miocene Epoch (about 12-20 million years ago). During this time, marine conditions extended inland to about Washington, D.C. - this accounts for the unusual character of the cliff-side strata and our beach sediment, which is rich in ancient Miocene fossils. For generations, scientists and collectors from around the world have

visited Brownies Beach to search for these remarkable finds, including shark teeth, whale bones, and extinct seashells.

Most important to the health and survival of Brownies Beach are the recycled sediments from that ancient Miocene seafloor – the cliff. To get a sense of how dependent beaches are on the erosional landscapes behind them, think of an undeveloped cliff as a reliable "bank account" of sediment, routinely slumping and re-supplying the more dynamic "checking account" of the windward beach. If that re-supply disappears, the relentless erosion of waves and current strips the sand away, causing the beach to narrow and allowing the sea to encroach closer.

To most of us who live in Chesapeake Beach, the reality of modern sea-level rise and rapid erosion of the Miocene cliffs should come as no surprise. The Rt. 261 bridge over Fishing Creek is now too low to guarantee safe passage of boats coming and going during high tide, due to the combined effects of our slowly subsiding landscape, and a global sea level that has risen over a foot in the past century. Estimates of coastal erosion range from 1-2 feet per year in our region, accelerated by the combination of rising seas, loose sedimentary shoreline materials, a narrow "knife-edge" tidal range, and the regular pounding of the western shore by windwhipped winter waves and occasional hurricanes. In fact, when Captain John Smith sailed up the Chesapeake Bay 400 years ago, our shoreline likely extended about 400-800 feet farther east than it does today (sediment cores my students and I have taken in the marsh behind Brownies Beach confirm this process, called "retrogradation," or shoreline retreat). One only needs to view the difficulty with which our North Beach neighbors have struggled to keep their recreational beach and pier intact to appreciate the combined problem of present-day sea-level rise and coastal erosion. Indeed, late 19th and early 20th Century rates of shoreline retreat near Holland Point are among the fastest measured anywhere in our region – over 900 feet in less than 100 years. This has led to considerable engineering of the shoreline north of Brownies Beach, with bouldersized rip-rap and bulkheads armoring the lower landscapes, and groins and jetties extending outward to catch or block the little available sand moving by. However, the problem with this shoreline engineering is that it inadvertently starves downstream (southern) beaches of the sediment they depend on.

Here is the three-fold dilemma facing virtually all bayside beaches in the coming century: world sea level is rising at an accelerating pace, our regional landscape is gradually subsiding, and there's less beach sediment available to go around. Brownies Beach faces all these challenges as well. The most enduring gift we can give it is to ensure its connection to the erosional cliffs to the south—the geologic bank account that presently sustains it.

Dr. Kenneth Rasmussen teaches Geology and Oceanography at Northern Virginia Community College and George Washington University, and makes his home near Brownies Beach.

Attention All Property Owners/Tenants

Re: Water/Sewer Billing Procedure for Town of Chesapeake Beach

July 1, 2014 marked the first day of the new Water/Sewer Rate Schedule for the Town of Chesapeake Beach. The schedule was adopted by the Town Council on May 15, 2014. The schedule was mailed to all property owners in early June. Please call Town Hall if you would like a copy mailed to your address. Also, you can download a copy by going to www.chesapeake-beach.md.us and scrolling down the home page to the page that says "Pay Your Utility Bill Online." The following is a brief explanation of how our billing procedure works:

The Town of Chesapeake Beach invoices Town residents quarterly for their water and sewer usage. Billing dates are April 15, July 15, October 15 and January 15. Most likely, if you live in the "town limits" you are on the Town's utility system. Please check your bill for the supplier information. Town bills are clearly marked "Town of Chesapeake Beach."

The sewer usage is directly related to the water that flows through your water meter, unless you have a sub-meter installed. When you receive your bill you will notice that your consumption usage is plainly listed on the bill. That usage is based on the meter reading we receive from a radio signal that is emitted from your meter to our receiver located in a Town vehicle while riding through your neighborhood.

If there is no signal coming from your meter, we must read the meter manually to obtain an accurate reading. Sometimes that is not possible, since in certain locations meters are located inside of the home. If your bill has "ESTIMATE" printed on it, your usage is being based on your average consumption over several quarters because we have not been able to read your meter either manually or through the radio signaling system. You should contact our office at 410-257-2230 and ask for the Utility Billing Clerk. We will make an appointment to come change your meter reading equipment. The Town does not charge for replacing your existing equipment. However, it is your responsibility to allow us the access to make repairs. If arrangements are not made to have equipment repaired or replaced, the Town has the authority to turn off water until repairs and/or replacements are made.

The Town has a policy stating that the quarterly utility bill must be sent to the property owner. This policy is enforced to protect the property owners from tenants being delinquent with payments. Payment delinquency can result in water turn off and eventually in property going to public tax sale.

You always have at least 30 days to pay your bill without incurring a penalty. Bills may be paid online. You must register at www.myutilityaccount.com/login.php?utilityid=1062 which is available on the Chesapeake Beach Website www.chesapeake-beach.md.us/. Should you encounter problems logging in and creating a password, please contact Town Hall and ask for Fran who will gladly help you set up the online payment access.

Of course, you can simply mail your payment in using the address of PO Box 400, Chesapeake Beach, MD 20732. We also take payments by phone (410) 257-2230 using a credit/debit card
