Operation Hope on the Chesapeake, through Operation Second Chance, sponsors an annual fishing trip and barbecue for our wounded veterans and their families. This year our guests will be spending the night and have the opportunity to enjoy everything the Chesapeake Bay has to offer. The event will begin in the early morning of Saturday, August 16th and conclude at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 17th.

Most of you have read my letters telling about our military heroes. This time I decided to write about a different kind of hero. *On Saturday morning, these heroes line the streets to welcome our honored guests.* I make the journey down the motorcade route before the busses so I have seen each one of you. There is the mother still in her pajamas with small children, the older man sitting in a lawn chair and the groups that represent everyone in-between, coming together to share the experience. I always ask myself, is this mother the wife of someone serving overseas? Is the old man in the chair a veteran from a previous war? Are these people the brothers, sisters or other loved ones of our service men and women? However connected, I have read your banners and signs and your message is loud and clear – this Town loves our military heroes!

On one occasion, I remember standing outside the bus in the Rod 'N' Reel parking lot waiting to welcome our guests. The doors did not open as ex-

pected; I waited for what felt like an eternity. Finally, the doors opened and I stepped on the bus. The driver softly said, "I had to give these guys a minute to get themselves together." As I looked at the driver and then the passengers on the bus, I saw tears running down their faces. I promptly stepped off the bus and, as the driver explained, waited for the passengers to regain their composure.

You stood along the side of the road and you filled their hearts with Hope on the Chesapeake.

It never fails that someone will ask how we manage to pull it off; how do people pull together to make this weekend happen. The "Green Shirts" as I call them, work hard all year long to make this weekend a reality. They are always looking for funding, donations and volunteers. Their diligence brings with them new volunteers, opportunities and ideas. Every year I am able to see this happen repeatedly, the person in the back of the room that steps up and says, "I will do it." They never disappoint. They work tirelessly without complaining, each doing it for their own personal reasons. *In any case, Operation Hope on the Chesapeake would not happen without the "Green Shirts," our volunteers.*

Over the years, our volunteers have learned some valuable lessons, and I would like to share a few with you.

- Never put ice for the barbecue on a fire truck — emergencies happen.

- The crabby old veteran that fries the chicken for the barbecue does not need your help. He has everything under control.
- It is hard to put a luggage tag on a prosthetic leg.
- Maggie C., there is a wounded veteran that fell in love with you in front of Tyler's Tackle Shop. Although you do not know it, your kindness made a difference.
- No need to worry about the weather as heaven accepts emails. The driving rain just as it is time to round everyone up to board the bus on Sunday afternoon is a lifesaver.
- Our guests are never hungry, if you are going to worry about something, worry about how we are going to get all the leftovers on the bus to go back to the hospital.

Other Heroes come in the form of our contributors that have donated goods and services for this event.

Things can change with a few hundred flags and some free printing from two separate contributors; put them together and you can paint the streets of Town red, white and blue. A donation of fishing poles has turned into an overnight stay — what veteran would want to go back to the hospital without casting a line from the North Beach pier? No fishing would take place without a fishing license. But don't fret, there is a hero in Town that takes care of that. *You open your hearts and you make a difference.*

The final hero in the equation is the one that opens the checkbook and covers the remaining balance. The economy has stalled, but your generosity stays strong. For each person, business or organization that was not able to give as much, there was one who made up the difference. Your financial contributions have allowed us to grow and create new opportunities for our wounded veterans and their families. You have given them hope.

Southern Maryland is Hope on the Chesapeake for our wounded military. Our goal is to work quietly and do some good. On behalf of our wounded veterans and their families, I would like to thank you for your generosity and kindness that has never failed. ■

Chesapeake Beach Water Park – Great for the Community

The Town of Chesapeake Beach recently received results from an economic Impact study of the Chesapeake Beach Water Park. The study was conducted by BEACON, Business Economic and Community Outreach Network at Salisbury University on the Eastern Shore.

The project leader for BEACON was Dr. Memo Diriker, Professor of Business and Economic Development, Franklin P. Perdue School of Business, Salisbury, MD. The following are a few points of interest developed from the study:

- The Chesapeake Beach Water Park is a very important economic development asset for the Town of Chesapeake Beach. The Park attracts a significant number of visitors who are responsible for a very high amount of primary, secondary and tertiary economic activity throughout the Town. Visitors to the Park generate \$3.2 million in total economic impact for the Town and support over 150 local jobs. The Park generates "fresh" money into the Town because a large percentage of the spending is initiated by visitors to our community who are coming because of a locally manufactured product called "The Water Park."
- While the Park is a great economic asset as it is, there is still much that can be done to increase its total value to the Town. With some additional repairs and upgrades, the Park could greatly increase its offerings. These upgrades would generate additional income and therefore additional economic activity for the Town.
- The Park is not an attractive candidate for privatization in its current state, but with upgrades there would be the possibility of privatizing certain portions.
- The Chesapeake Beach Water Park has served the Town of Chesapeake Beach admirably in the past. With a modest amount of reinvestment, the Park can be of even higher value to the Town's taxpayers in the future. ■

Oyster Hatchery, Oyster Reef Balls and Annual Oyster Planting

On July 11, the Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS) became the newest oyster hatchery on the Chesapeake Bay. After weeks of trying through Maryland DNR and the Oyster Restoration Project, I was able to obtain oyster larvae from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. This allowed us to complete another step in the oyster growing cycle. We received around 5,000 larvae (less than a quarter of a teaspoon full, see picture with napkin) and introduced them into a 300 gallon tank filled with our oyster balls and MGO cages. The Chesapeake Beach Maintenance Staff was instrumental in getting the tank and associated equipment ready. The tank is located at the trail head and will be recycling Fishing Creek water through it for the next two weeks. The oyster balls and MGO cages will then be removed, and we will count the new spat on each. This process has been repeated two or three times dur-

ing the summer and will continue into the early fall. Students and interested parties can observe this exciting new addition to our program.

CBOCS oyster reef ball manufacturing is now almost complete. There is only one week remaining before they will be deployed on the Old Rock Reef. To date more than 30 oyster reef balls have been molded. Don't miss out on this final opportunity to get your own autographed oyster ball placed with the others on **August 23.**

Come back on **September 6, at 10 a.m.** to load up the cages with new spat, count them and place them under the trail. Also, individuals hosting MGO cages should pick them up at this time.

2014 Stars & Stripes Festival

On behalf of the Planning Committee, we would like to thank all committee members, volunteers, participants, performers and attendees for making the 2014 Chesapeake Beach Stars & Stripes Festival (CBSSF) the biggest Festival yet. The theme of honoring the Fallen Heroes of the Vietnam War brought a number of exciting activities into Town. Many men and women were never given the proper respect and recognition they deserved, and we wanted to do our part in attempting to honor all who served during this War.

After nearly one year of communications with the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, we were given the opportunity to host their Mobile Museum. Our Festival began with the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Mobile Museum coming into Town with a full escort of police, fire and rescue and Nam Knights. The Town was decorated red, white and blue by home and business owners.

Friday brought the Fox Channel 5 News team who spent all morning sharing Chesapeake Beach with their viewers and

highlighting our Festival on their Friday Zip Trip. Several must see locations were focal points of the show: Veterans' Memorial Park, Water Park, Railway Trail, Railway Museum and enjoying seafood. Kids from Beach Elementary shared their artwork with the camera as well as sang a song. The Young Marines and Explorers both made appearances as did Sam Grow, Twin Beach Players and Mayor Wahl. The Fox 5 team visited all the focal points as well as the Mobile Museum.

I had the opportunity to spend some



time around the Mobile Museum observing people. My fondest experience was a group of five or six Vietnam Veterans standing in a circle in front of the Museum sharing their experiences. They were adorned with either a Vietnam or branch of a military hat or shirt. It was a sight to see as they shook hands and heads. You could almost know what they were saying by watching their actions. I saw men break down and cry and comforted by their spouse. Some people walked by quickly – some took their time to read and experience everything within the Museum's walls. The purpose of the Museum is not only to educate and share memorabilia left at the Wall in Washington, D.C., but also to help heal those who have been unable to visit the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall. We hope that everyone who visited the Museum left with a bit of a history lesson on the Vietnam War and a sense of why we want to bring back the true meaning of Memorial Day.

Our Festival kicked off with our Opening Ceremony on Saturday morning. Master of Ceremonies Mayor Bruce Wahl introduced VIPs and dignitaries as well as our guest speaker, Mr. Wayne Karlin, a

Vietnam Veteran, author of many books, and professor at the College of Southern Maryland. There was not a dry eye left in the house as he spoke of his personal experiences in Vietnam. His voice said it all as you heard it crack and watched him fight back the tears as he paid homage to his brothers who never made it home.

Our Family Fun Day presented a free picnic donated by the Williams Stallings American Legion Post 206 with both fun and educational activities for all ages focusing on our youth. Our mission is to educate our youth and our community and to bring back the true meaning of Memorial Day. Kellam's Field was decorated with artwork honoring our fallen heroes from students of Beach Elementary School. There were games and prizes, moon bounces and slides, popcorn and snow cones and country music galore. The crowds came and stayed to experience the Southern Maryland hometown talents of Wesley Spangler and Sam Grow.

Local community theatre group, the Twin Beach Players, led by Sid Curl presented a Bob Hope Radio Show to a sold out crowd at the North Beach Volunteer Fire Department. The players were joined

by local talents Jamie Zemarel of the famed Capitol Steps and Marina Ybarra. Co-Chair of the Festival, Bob Snider, assembled a talented group of musicians to complete the show which featured comedy routines and music from the Vietnam era.

The weekend ended with the annual Memorial Day Ceremony at Veterans' Memorial Park hosted by Williams Stallings American Legion, Post 206. The Nam Knights of America, MD Old Line Chapter unveiled and dedicated the new Vietnam Veterans Memorial. If you have not seen the Memorial, please make a point to stop by Veterans' Memorial Park and be sure to thank any Nam Knight member you see for working so hard to raise the money for the Memorial which honors all those who lost their lives in Vietnam.

With Sadness, Announcing the Passing of Cookbook Author

Arnold Louis "Whitey" Schmidt

Arnold Louis "Whitey" Schmidt – noted cookbook author – has passed away. He went peacefully at his home art studio in Crisfield, Md. on Friday, July 18, 2014. He was 75 years old.

Known as the Chesapeake Bay's Blue Crab Guru, Schmidt authored 11 popular books on the region's cooking, culture and people. You may have seen many of these over the years around Town and in the Calvert Library Twin Beaches branch.

Schmidt's first book, *The Official Crab Eater's Guide* (1985), marked a milestone in the history of Bay country cooking. He would go on to publish the books *Seaside Dining: Views to Dine By*, *Bay Tripper* (Eastern and Western Shore editions), *The Chesapeake Bay Crabbiest Cookbook*, *The Chesapeake Bay Oyster Cookbook*, *The Eastern Shore Cookbook* and many others.

Through his work and life, Schmidt has touched thousands of individuals. He will be missed – but his work will live on.
