

This summer, Mayor Mahoney and the town council re-established the Chesapeake Beach Green Team in conjunction with the Sustainable Maryland Certification Program. The goal of the Team is to promote good stewardship and understanding of our unique environment as one of only two Maryland municipalities located directly on the Bay. Our town was first certified under the Sustainable Maryland program in July, 2014, and we are pleased to announce that we were recently re-certified!



EDUCATION

Calvert County fifth grade students are participating in their annual field trips to the Chesapeake Beach Railway trail during October and November.



Approximately 850 students, teachers and chaperones spend 4 hours during 13 visits learning about oysters and the waters of Fishing Creek. This program is facilitated by CBOCS and run by Calvert County Natural Resources personnel.

FUN ON THE TRAIL

Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail NATURE BINGO continues to challenge trail walkers to find 25 different natural items as they walk the trail. During the past year more than 700 bingo cards have been picked up at the head of the trail in the brochure box. Make sure to get your copy and play.

Maryland is in the midst of an opioid and heroin abuse epidemic; its effects-addiction, overdose, death, chronic illness, child neglect, child abuse, job loss, unemployment, theft, and more-reverberate among our communities devastating the lives of our families, friends and neighbors, affecting us all. In 2016, eighteen people suffered opioid overdoses in Chesapeake Beach with two people, tragically, losing their lives. On March 1, 2017, Governor Hogan signed an Executive Order declaring a State of Emergency in response to the heroin, opioid, and fentanyl crisis. In 2017, as of September 12, sixty-four people have overdosed on opioids/ opiates in Calvert County-twelve people in Chesapeake Beach (4 fatalities) and five in North Beach.

Please help shine light on opioid addiction by learning more about Opioid Use Disorder, those it afflicts, and available treatment resources. Opioid Use Disorder is an illness, not a character flaw.

Join us on December 13, 2017, 6:30-8:30 pm at the Northeast Community Center for a presentation on addiction prevention, treatment, and counseling services available through county and state agencies, and local non-profit organizations to help individuals and families suffering from the opioid crisis. In addition to the presentation, resource providers will be on hand to answer questions and provide guidance on how to seek assistance. Opioid overdose response training (naloxone administration) will also be available, and a free naloxone kit provided to those who successfully complete the training.



WATER SEWER RATES

In 2014, construction began to upgrade the Town's Waste Water Treatment Plant into one of Maryland's first Enhanced Nutrient Removal (ENR) Water Reclamation Treatment Plants. This 18-million-dollar project received substantial completion in the Fall of 2016 to, among other things, rebuild the plant's Biological Nutrient Removal process control treatment system; install two new Clarifiers to double the treatment volume in the plant; install a new sludge belt filter press to double the capacity for solids removal; install a denitrification filter system to remove nitrates, phosphorous and total suspended solids; and, install a more efficient UV disinfection system to replace an old chlorine gas system. These upgrades process up to 1.5 MGD (Million Gallons a Day) providing clean effluents to the Bay, an opportunity to reuse effluent for Town irrigation and more efficient plant operations.

With the completion of the ENR upgrades, the Town is now required to start repaying a 4-million-dollar bond secured in 2014 to fund our portion of the construction costs, adding a \$190,000 principal and interest payment to an already stressed Utility Fund budget. Incorporating this new bond payment, initial water and sewer rate calculations indicated a 50% increase would be needed. Working together, members of Council and staff came together in January to develop a new balanced Utility Fund budget structure which minimizes the impacts to Town residents and businesses.

At an April work session, a balanced Utility Fund budget was proposed which, (1) paid off 2 of the 5 Utility Fund debts, saving the Town over \$350,000 in future interest payments; (2) established an ENR reserve fund to allow for a future Council to fully pay off the ENR bond principal at first opportunity; and, (3) created a capital improvements reserve fund, funded by capital connection fees, to allow for proactive maintenance and repair of the Towns utility distribution system.

While we were able to greatly reduce the impacts of this new debt, it was impossible to balance the budget without a very modest rate increase. In May, the Council approved the proposed Utility Fund budget for fiscal year 2018 that results in a quarterly sewer rate increase from \$5.00 to \$5.57 per 1000 gallons and a quarterly water rate increase from \$1.80 to \$2.01 per 1000 gallons. For the median Town resident who uses 10,000 gallons per quarter, this will result in a \$7.80 increase in their quarterly bill, or \$2.60 per month.

The Mayor, Council and Staff strive to provide the best services to our residents and businesses while keeping local taxes and utility rates as low as possible. While we regret to make this small rate increase, we are extremely pleased to keep our water and sewer rates amongst the lowest in Maryland and to reinvest in our community by saving over \$350,000 in future debt interest payments.

BAYFRONT PARK NATURE WALK & TALK SERIES

This summer the Town of Chesapeake Beach initiated the Bayfront Park Nature Walk & Talk Series, a pilot-program geared to help enhance our quality of life by encouraging residents to get outdoors, get moving, and take part in active learning. And what better location to explore than our own Bayfront Park!

The first event, a spring bird identification walk, to be led by Mikey Lutmerding, a premiere birder in the mid-Atlantic region was unfortunately cancelled due to rain.

Dr. Ken Rasmussen, Professor of Geology at Northern Virginia Community College and town resident, led our second event guiding an eager group of 15 or so participants on a two-hour walking tour along the Bayfront Park shoreline where he discussed the geological origins, coastal geology, and dynamic forces that formed the cliffs 10-20 million years ago and continues to shape them to this day. The presentation was fantastic! And we hope to convince Ken to reprise his performance this fall.

Our third event, A Fossil Hunt & Identification Evening, was held on August 21st in collaboration with the Calvert Marine Museum. Dr. Stephen Godfrey, Curator of Paleontology, and John Nance, Paleontology Collections Manager, gave a fantastic presentation on

the fossils of Calvert County providing dozens of examples, and giving away samples of fossilized whale vertebra and mouth bones to the delight of all. Also, two local fossil collectors attended and shared their finds, including a 4-inch sperm whale tooth.

We hope you will join us on our next Nature Walk & Talk! They are
