



**MINUTES OF THE

January 18, 2018**

I. Patrick J. Mahoney, Mayor, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. In attendance were: Dr. Valerie L. Beaudin, Stewart B. Cumbo, Derek J. Favret, Lawrence P. Jaworski, Gregory J. Morris, and Keith L. Pardieck, Council Members, Holly K. Wahl, Town Administrator, Sharon L. Humm, Town Clerk, Laurie Smith, Town Treasurer, Elissa Levan, Town Attorney, James Berry, Public Works Administrator, Connie O'Dell, Code Enforcement Officer, Paul Woodburn, Town Engineer, Marilyn Van Wagner, Water Park General Manager, and Jon Castro, WRTP Superintendent. Absent were Christopher Jakubiak, Planning and Zoning Administrator and Lieutenant Naughton.

II. **Pledge of Allegiance.** The Beach Buccaneers football team led the Pledge of Allegiance.

III. **Approve the Agenda.**

MOTION: Councilman Jaworski moved to approve the agenda. Seconded by Councilman Pardieck, all in favor.

IV. **Public comment on any item on the agenda.** None.

V. **Approval of the minutes of the December 21, 2017 Public Hearing.**

VI. **Petitions and Communications**

A. **Special Presentation** – The Mayor welcomed the Beach Buccaneers 12U football team, coaching staff, and parents to the evening's meeting. Tonight's presentation is to honor and recognize all those involved in the winning of the All Pro Maryland State Championship title. The Mayor recognized each player and coaching staff member by name, read and presented a proclamation, and expressed congratulations to the team. The Mayor had the entire team and coaching staff come forward for pictures with the Council.

B. **North Beach Volunteer Fire Department** – Mr. Gordy submitted the attached written report but was not present to give the report.

C. **Deputy's Report** – Sergeant Phelps submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council. Councilman Morris thanked the Sergeant for including the total number of calls as requested.

- D. **Public Works Report** – Mr. Berry submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council. The Mayor thanked Mr. Berry and his crew for being on top of things last week with the snow that came in.
- E. **Code Enforcement Report** – Mrs. O’Dell submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council. Mrs. O’Dell gave a brief statement addressing the concerns received about why trees are being cut down along 261 in the area of Chesapeake Village. These trees are trees being affected by the emerald ash boring beetle.
- F. **Town Engineer’s Report** – Mr. Woodburn submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council. Mr. Woodburn addressed Councilwoman Beaudin’s inquires in reference to the improvement of the existing single boat ramp and how off-site spoil disposal locations are determined. Also thanked Mr. Woodburn for the dredge timeline.
- G. **Water Park Report** – Ms. VanWagner submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council.
- H. **Water Reclamation Treatment Plant Report** – Mr. Castro submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council.
- I. **Treasurer’s Report** – Mrs. Smith addressed financial questions from Councilwoman Beaudin.
- J. **Town Administrator’s Report**- Mrs. Wahl submitted the attached written report and was present to address the Council. Mrs. Wahl gave an update on the front entry way repairs. The masonry work is to commence the week of January 22nd, and a completion date is estimated to be by the end of February.
- K. **Mayor’s Report** –
 - 1. The Mayor presented his State of the Town Mayoral Address. The Mayor started off with stating that Chesapeake Beach is a strong town, and that is due to three things; 1) a Town Council that conducts itself with dignity and integrity, 2) an outstanding, efficient, and productive staff, and 3) the support of the citizens. The Mayor highlighted various items from his Mayoral Address and personally thanked each Council member, Mrs. Wahl and her staff, contractors, volunteers, and the citizenry for being an important part of this great town to which he is proud to be a part of.

VIII. **Report of Officers, Boards and Committees:**

- A. **Planning & Zoning Commission** – There was no meeting held in January.
- B. **Board of Appeals** – There was no hearing held in January.
- C. **Ethics Commission**– Mr. Kete reported that he would be meeting with the State Ethics Commission on January 22nd and the Ethics Commission will meet again on January 25th.

The commission will be looking to schedule training for elected officials, staff, and others soon.

D. Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society – John Bacon submitted the attached written report and was present to give the report. Mr. Bacon reported that on January 27th and 28th students from Beach Elementary will be painting the first Chesapeake Bay Sea Life banner which will be held at the Northeast Community Center.

E. Economic Development Committee – Councilman Jaworski reported the committee will meet again on January 22nd with a full agenda of items to discuss. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend.

F. MML Report – Councilman Cumbo reported the SMMA held their meeting last night with guest speaker Patricia Simpson, which spoke on Fracking Development in Southern Maryland and was pleased that the Mayor and the full Council were able to attend. Councilman Cumbo spoke briefly on MML procedures for considering legislation, municipal funding history on Highway User revenues and the three proposed legislative priorities.

G. Twin Beaches Opioid Abuse Awareness Coalition – Councilman Pardieck stated the committee met on January 15th reviewing the accomplishments of 2017 and what's to come for 2018, stating the End Addiction Community forum series will continue for 2018. Mr. Pardieck submitted the committee's 2017 activity report highlighting several items and took the opportunity to recognize and thank his co-chair, Cheryl Greene and all the committee members for their dedication and hard work for this cause.

H. Walkable Community Committee – Councilman Favret reported the committee meet on January 16th, recognizing in the audience, the two newest members, Amenda Brown and Jan Ruttkay, along with Charlie Fink and Teresa York who make up the committee. Mr. Favret stated the committee discussed short and long term plans, goals, and stated they would be working closely with the Planning and Zoning Commission and Zoning Administrator. Meetings are open to the public and welcomed all to come and join in.

XI. Public comment was received by:

1. Joe Johnson of 8089 Windward Key asked confirmation that the July 4th fireworks will be held on Saturday, June 30, 2018 this year. The Mayor stated yes.

2. Mr. Cumbo had no comment.

4. Mr. Morris congratulated the entire Beach Buccaneers organization and also commended Mrs. Wahl in working with the County to strengthen the relationship with them and the Town's commitment to improve the facilities at Kellams Field.
5. Mr. Pardieck thanked everyone for coming out and participating in their town government and wished everyone the best for 2018.
6. Mr. Favret thanked the Mayor, Mrs. Wahl and the staff for the State of the Town Mayoral Address which clearly displays town government at work.

In December of 2017, the Sheriff's Office handled 257 calls for service in Chesapeake Beach. This is up from 254 calls in November 2017.

From January 2017 until November 2017, I assisted patrol in answering 540 calls for service, and 208 traffic stops.

I investigated 5 unattended death 3 of which are overdose deaths. The overdose death are open cases

I investigated 2 assault which resulted in arrest.

I investigated 6 burglaries to include Subway and Beach Elementary School.

I investigated 8 Fraud investigation.

I conducted 2 search warrants to collect evidence in ongoing investigations.

I completed 28 other case reports for other incidents with the towns limits.

I assisted in 3 narcotic investigation that were closed in 2017

I completed 69 community service hours, which include speaking with business members and members of the community about problems that are occurring in the neighborhood.

I attended an investigation school in December.

Water leak- We have had several water line breaks on the home owners side that we have responded to. We also had a main water line freeze and break at the water park.

Wet wells- We are waiting for pump 3 to arrive back from the repair shop so we can reinstall it at Mears avenue pump station. The block heater went down at Richfield Station main wet well and has been replaced. The very cold weather is causing other issues at our wet wells.

Water meter/MXU- The last reading for the calendar year is complete and with that report in, we can go back to changing out failing MXU's

Flushing- Our next flush is scheduled for March of 2018.

Ball fields – We are in the process of winterizing the entire complex at the time of this report.

Rail Way Trail – We are keeping an eye out for the oyster cages. The ice has overtaken most of them.

Water park - With the extreme cold weather there will be some areas of concrete and some plumbing issues to deal with in the spring.

SHA bridge- They are now working on the Northeast side of the bridge and are still on schedule as of this report.

Snow – We have had our share of extremely cold weather and some snow. Temperatures in the teens make it very difficult to wash off salt from our equipment and trucks after the snow efforts.

Emergency calls – We received 7 emergency calls. 6 were for water shut offs due to lines freezing and or bursting. 1 for snow removal issues.

NEW BUSINESS

Fishing Creek Bridge (MD Route 261) –

January, 2017 Update: The new Town water and sewer mains are being constructed below the newly constructed east bridge span. We are working with the contractor to install new fire hydrants and to prepare for system turnover for the west span construction. – No new utility updates.

Fishing Creek Dredging –

January, 2017 Update: The dredging contractor has completed the dredge and has completed stabilization of the north embankment and swale area adjacent to the spoil site. We continue to work with MDE to resolve the maintenance issues associated with the north swale area. A meeting with MDE was held to discuss immediate and future swale maintenance needs and to discuss closure of the current project. We have been told that a decision has been made by MDE on compliance and the Town should receive the decision in the first few weeks of January. We will also be moving forward with a new permit application to clean this swale area in the future. We are also researching off-site spoil disposal location options in anticipation of a future dredge. We believe a portion of the existing spoil material can be reorganized on-site and the remainder will need to go off-site to an approved disposal site. We are moving forward with a grading permit to move a portion (approximately 1/3rd) of the existing spoil to the smaller North Basin and access road areas. The Corps of Engineers has acknowledged the need for a future dredge and will be seeking to get it in the FX19 budget cycle. Once funding is appropriated (Approx. \$250,000 for Engineering and 2 million for Construction Dredging) the project should go thru 1 year of design to permit for an anticipated construction start of (Fall 2020).

Kellans Marina –

January, 2017 Update: We are assisting with a new application to the State MDNR to obtain grant funding to improve the existing single boat ramp. This will also include obtaining construction permits and bidding.

Richfield Station –

January, 2017 Update: The traffic warrant study is complete and has been delivered to the State for review. The study indicates that a light for eastbound and westbound Route 260 and Harris Boulevard is warranted. We received a response via email on September 13, 2017 from the SHA saying that they are “not opposed to signalization of the intersection” but they wanted a few pieces of additional information to finalize the warrant request. Comments responses to the September letter were sent to SHA for a new traffic light and to ask them to also look at other possible alternatives to a light if they are available. No response back from SHA (Greg Phillips) yet. – We are told a response is likely by the end of January.

WRTP –

January, 2017 Update: We are in the ENR testing period and are in the final project close out phase. We continue to coordinate with the contractor (Bearing) and consultant (WRA) for the project this month to review closure documents and testing procedures. We have been working thru issuance of the final use and occupancy permit and warranty items and hope to obtain closeout soon. We are also working with MDE on final project cost and accounting items.

261 Sidewalk -

January, 2017 Update: We are working on the sidewalk Design RFP with Holly and hope to have approval from the State to go put out the Engineering Design Services RFP soon.

Heritage –

January, 2017 Update: Site work (grading) is continuing. Ongoing meetings are being held with the Contractor and Owner to ensure the Town Staff is engaged thru the grading and construction process. Grading has been slow due to weather and moist soil conditions.

Water and Sewer Manual –

January, 2017 Update: We are working with Town Staff and Councilman Jaworski on the update of the 1985 water and sewer manual.

OLD BUSINESS

Kellams Field – We have received design parameters from American Irrigation to determine the connection needs (pressure & volumes) for the purple pipe. This work can be performed in conjunction with the WWTP upgrades after final completion and acceptance of the facility. (No new update).

The ENR Upgrade inspections by Calvert County are nearly completed. On 11-12-17, the Calvert County Electrical final inspection was done and passed. The remaining issue is for the Calvert County Building Inspector to sign off on the Building Permit and close out all inspections. The last inspection was on 12-8-2017 by Calvert County. The Inspector did not pass on 3 items. We are waiting for Bearing Construction to work out these issues and reschedule for a final inspection. This will complete the project for closeout.

Mid Atlantic Contracting is working on putting together the detailed scope and prints for the RFP on the CBWRP Lab Upgrade. This work will detail the Lab Upgrade and assist the Bidders on acquiring a more accurate bid for this project. The RFP will go out in January 2018.

The new Effluent Flow Meter arrived at the plant on 12-8-17. The new Basin valves have also arrived. Plant staff will check out the new equipment and make sure all needed parts are in place for installation and will have them installed in January-18. Parts were ordered and work should begin February 2018 waiting on one more item to arrive then installation will be scheduled.

Plant staff are continuing to work on spare parts inventory along with finding vendors for pricing on spare parts. Staff is also working on SOP's for all new ENR equipment.

The scheduled Bio-Monitoring Testing will begin in January 2018. This test is for the EPA and MDE in the plant's permit. The testing will be done by BMI in Blacksburg, VA. Plant staff is in the process to complete all 2017 annual reporting due to the EPA and MDE which will be completed and sent to these agencies January 2018.

There were no incidents to report in the plant's Solids and Handling Operation or the Lab Sampling Operation with Old Line Hauling and Chesapeake Labs. The new hauling contract will take effect on June 30, 2017 with Old Line Inc.

Plant operations for this monthly report did not use the Shell Fish Tank to divert plant flow.

The plant had 10 emergency alarms for this report period. Three were due to air inlet valve failures, 4 call-ins were Filter operation high levels, one was a backwash pump failure, one was a sampler breaker trip, and one power failure. Staff responded to all call-ins and were able to correct the alarm conditions.

The Wastewater Treatment Plant had no spills to report for this January report.

Future Projects:

To complete the ENR Upgrade Construction. The projects noted in the Capital Projects request are also in progress to be completed within the completion date or within two years after the ENR Upgrade.



Town Administrators Report – January 2018

I. Upcoming Requests for Proposals:

Formal RFP'S

Updates for ongoing RFPs:

WRTP Lab Renovation: Lab renovation drawing/design is complete. RFP to be released on January 19th, 2018.

Side Walk Design Phase, per the fully executed MOU: SHA Office of Procurement and Contract Management (OPCM) has the RFP package and is reviewing it for final approval prior to release. Our contact with the State, Gretchen Hardman, is escalating this with her contacts for a response from SHA's procurement office.

Dredge Spoil Placement: The Town has an existing grant in the amount of \$125,000 for the reclamation of the Town's dredged material placement (DMP) site. Placement locations are limited, but working towards an RFP for the placement of the spoil to utilize funds available from DNR during this fiscal year.

II. Town Assets:

Town Hall:

- a. Front entry way repairs are planned to start the week of January 22nd pending the weather. Masonry will begin work first with fabrications of the railings taking place once the masonry is complete. Masonry will take one week to install; railing lengths will then be measured, and we have a 6-week lead time for the railings. Estimated completion date for the project is the end of February.
- b. Town Hall interior renovations were completed within the Administrative areas.
- c. A leak was discovered within the hallway of Town Hall during freezing conditions. The leak was caused by a condensate line that ran outside of the building freezing and backing up into the building ceiling. A plumber cut the line off at the exterior side to prevent back up and leaking as a temporary fix. The line should be run interior and be connected to the slop sink rather than exterior, which will continue to freeze. The permanent fix is being quoted for repair to take place.
- d. Town Hall HVAC issues continue, and we are currently quoting the replacement of the HVAC system that powers the chambers and atrium areas for FY19. Our contractor flushed the lines and installed a new fan, but replacement of this system is imminent.

Equipment:

A public auction was initiated for the sale and pick up of a **FORD 2001 Crown Victoria** that has not been in use for many years. The auction is available at <https://municibid.com/Listing/Details/14727075> and will end on Wednesday January 31, 2018 at 12:00. All bidders should place their bids through Municibid or contact me at Town Hall if you have issues accessing the site.

Kellam's Field: Currently working with the County in preparation for the release of the Spring schedule for the fields as well as Spring maintenance.

Bay Front park: Security cameras are accessible by law enforcement 24/7 via an IP address and log in.

Water Park: The water park is considering new POS (Point of Sale) systems that meet the growing needs of the park. We are currently looking at utilizing options already available through “cashiering” in our existing accounting software, Tyler Technologies, as well as other platforms developed specifically for water parks.

Floodgate: The Town received a letter from MDE confirming that there are no objections to making changes to the Floodgate structure between Seagate and Horizons. Town staff, Town Engineer and Councilman Jaworski are working towards assessing the structure to identify a scope of work for changes to the structure.

In 2016, 18 people overdosed on opioids or opiates in Chesapeake Beach with two fatalities. These tragedies, along with growing signs of an opioid crisis in the surrounding counties and states as reported in the news media, spurred the newly elected Mayor and Town Council to form an opioid abuse awareness committee in December 2016 and quickly partnered with the Town of North Beach to better serve both of our communities.

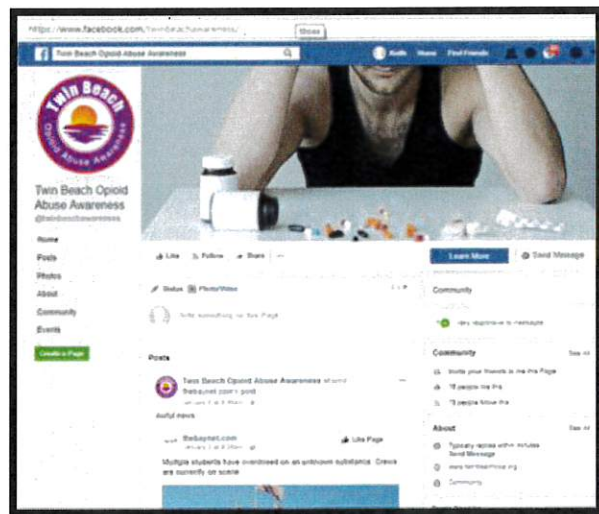
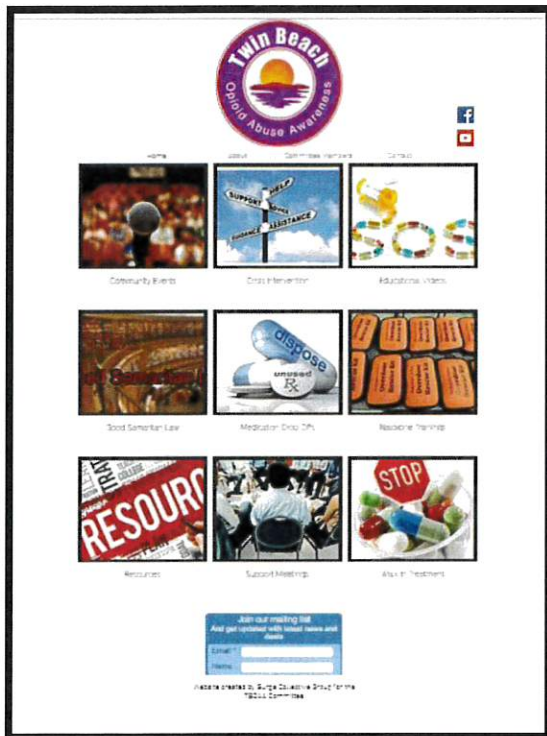

- End Addiction Community Forums.

Developed and implemented an End Addiction Community Forum Series to provide educational opportunities to raise awareness of opioid addiction in the community, reduce stigma associated with Opioid Abuse Disorder, and provide information on recovery and counseling services. To make TBOAAC forums more attractive to the public we combined three services in each event: educational addiction-oriented presentations, Opioid Overdose Response training (Naloxone), and prescription drug drop-offs. Four events were presented in 2017 at the Northeast Community Center located in Chesapeake Beach. The End Addiction Community forums were:

- **Signs & Symptoms** – March 22: 24 attendees, 8 received naloxone training, several pounds of prescription drugs collected.
- **Stigma & Statistics** – June 21: 20 attendees, 5 received naloxone training, no prescription drugs collected.
- **Enabling** – Sept. 20: 16 attendees, 3 received naloxone training, three bottles of prescription drugs collected.
- **Resource Fair** – Dec. 13: 30 attendees, 12 addiction recovery resource providers participated, Calvert County Prosecuting Attorney Andrew Rappaport discussed drug court and Good Samaritan Law, approximately 10 people received naloxone training, no prescription drugs collected.

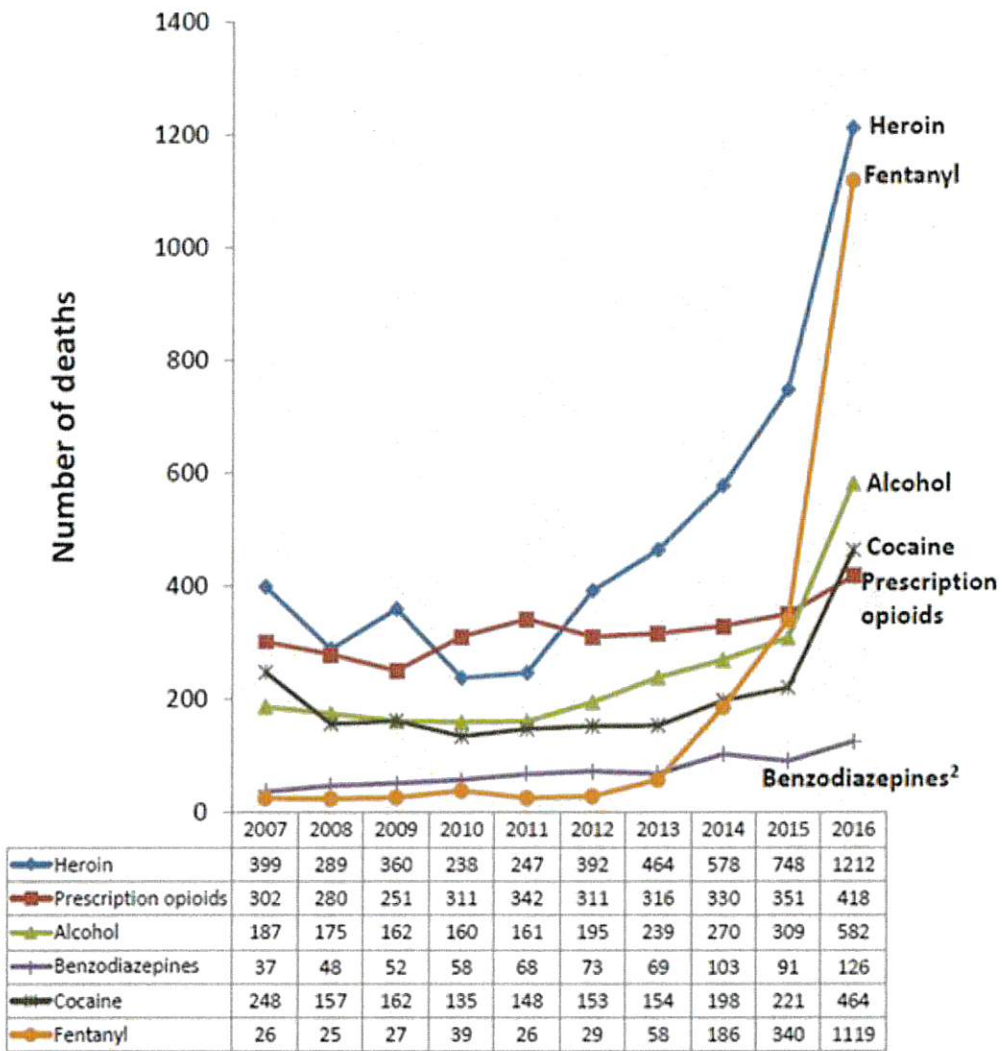

Figure 5. Total Number of Drug- and Alcohol-Related Intoxication Deaths by Selected Substances¹, Maryland, 2007-2016.




¹Since an intoxication death may involve more than one substance, counts of deaths related to specific substances do not sum to the total number of deaths.
